Boggs also explores other aspects of fertility and infertility: the way longing for a child plays out in the classic Coen brothers film *Raising Arizona*; the depiction of childlessness in literature, from *Macbeth* to *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?*; the financial and legal complications that accompany alternative means of family making; the private and public expressions of iconic writers grappling with motherhood and fertility. She reports, with great empathy, complex stories of couples who adopted domestically and from overseas, LGBT couples considering assisted reproduction and surrogacy, and women and men reflecting on childless or child-free lives. In *The Art of Waiting*, Boggs deftly distills her time of waiting into an expansive contemplation of fertility, choice, and the many possible roads to making a life and making a family.
