The essays focus on history and historiography, exploring how scholarly constructs and ideologies mould historical, literary and cultural data and shape scholarly discourse. Most of the essays illustrate the development of what has been called a minimalist methodology. Among the many central topics examined are the formation of the Jewish scriptural canon and how the concepts of prophecy and apocalypse illuminate the emergence of Judaism in the late Persian and Hellenistic periods.
